

Study Visit

'Italy-Greece-Turkey on Foot'

Date: 27 May – 1 June 2019

Place, venue: Apulia regions : Monte Sant'Angelo, San Giovanni Rotondo, Polignano a Mare, Monopoli, Bari.

Objectives: showcase of best practices of the Apulia region in terms of pilgrims' hospitality and routes development.

Activities:

- Meetings: with associations of Monte Sant'Angelo, the mayor and vice-mayor in charge
 of tourism in Monte Sant'Angelo, meeting with the representatives of the Apulia Regions
 (Anna Introna and Angelo Fabio Attolico).
- Hikes: in Gargano National park and between Polignano a Mare and Monopoli.
- Cultural Activities: degustation of Monte Sant'Angelo bread, visit to the St Michael the Archangel Sanctuary, Sanctuary of St Padre Pio, Church of St Nicolas, guided tour of Monte Sant'Angelo and Bari.















Debriefing meeting points and suggestions:

- Max Smit: Sultan's trail and Via Egnatia don't aspire voting at the moment, that is why we could try to imagine an alternative way of their membership (such as 'Via Eurasia Friends').
- Theodoros: the process of establishing a route on the ground level and then grow up is different from establishing an international association from scratch.
- How do we represent? Max suggested the association to be represented by the routes.
- Eirini has some contacts from Greece about engineering and would try to connect us.
- Hu: where does VEU start and finish in Rome or Bari? After the discussion we decided that it ends in Rome. (to be discussed with Stefano Dominioni).
- Traveller someone who loves walking and enjoys adventures and walks along the specific cultural heritage is our target audience.
 It is better to avoid a 'pilgrim' definition, cause the future route has 3 major religions along the route and it is reasonable to avoid any potential difficulties of inter-religious dialogue.
- Max proposed to avoid the word road and change it into a route. He also suggested to add 'use of routes' in the theme.
- A suggestion to theme justification: 'Walking in historical environment of 3 empires is amazing, it is exciting to walk in the context of historical geography'.
- Our very special element is to connect rural areas together.

Participants' feedback on the study visit:

- Overall very positive feedback of the study visit;
- Participants learnt about the country, its culture and traditions.
- They really enjoyed the guided tours, different guides which we had gave lots of added values and were very interesting.
- They learnt the standards of the VF and local hospitality practices, services and their structure in the region;















- Impressed by the services, hospitality, content of rural tourism, as well as the routes the quality of paths as they were all very well marked;
- They learnt a deeper understanding of the CoE CR structures;
- Some participants expressed interest in participating in the VEU to learn best practices and nomination procedures for the CoE CR;
- Representatives of municipalities will pass the knowledge to their teams and superiors;
- Theodoros especially liked the combination of hiking and local culture in our programme. He enjoyed the discussions with management and looking for benefits of CR helping rural areas and villages, everything which is in between the big cities, that is the key point of a CR.
- Interesting to learn if there are tourist products about cultural routes Theodoros is interested in having a package.
- It would be interesting to replicate this study visit in Turkey

Observations and notes for future actions:

- Interpretation and translation are very important;
- Guided tours were very appreciated and are of crucial importance;
- It is vital to organise a debriefing with plenty of time for discussion and debates;
- Free time for participants should always be dedicated;
- Human contact is significant. When the participants of a meeting could join us for a hike and a dinner, it was very much appreciated.
